Opening the polls

1. When setting up the polling place room, which of the following should be considered:

2. **TRUE** or **FALSE**?
All judges must take the oath and sign the *Official Precinct Certification Form*, regardless of what shift they are working
3. **TRUE** or **FALSE**?
You need to mark a test ballot with the OmniBallot in the morning
4. If the "Public Count" on the ballot counter is any number other than 0 when you turn it on in the morning, you should:
 - a. Proceed as normal
 - b. Put that number of ballots in the ballot box
 - c. Contact election headquarters immediately for guidance
 - d. Postpone the opening of the polling place
5. **TRUE** or **FALSE**?
When comparing the ballot and the *Zero Tape*, offices and candidates must match order.

General rules & procedures

1. **TRUE or FALSE?**
A voter can wear campaign materials tied to a party, candidate, or issue/question that is NOT on the ballot.

2. Party balance is required for all of the following polling place tasks except:

 - b. Initialing unmarked ballots
 - c. Duplicating ballots
 - d. Emptying the ballot box

3. When are news media permitted in the polling place?

Greeter Judge

Poll book judge (registering voters)

Challenges

Demonstration judge

Ballot judge

1. After opening up a sealed pack of ballots, the first thing you should do is:

Ballot counter judge

1. **TRUE or FALSE?**
If a voter brings in a mailed absentee ballot, you can allow them to mark and count that ballot.
2. When an error message appears on the ballot counter, the first thing you should do is:

Closing the polls
